Dance Directors Named

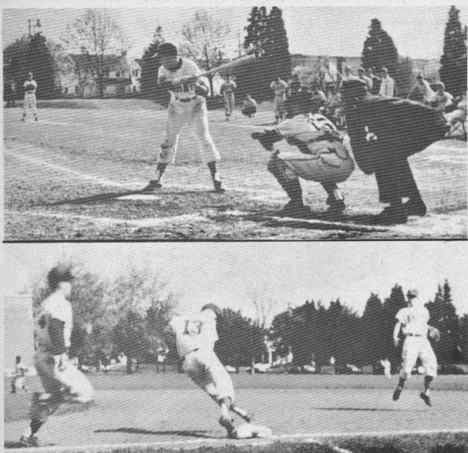

G-Men Dump Roosevelt, Finish Third in League

Capping off the 1964 baseball season with a win, the Generals deprived Roosevelt of any hope of winning the P.I.L. title this season by dumping their opponents 3-1 last Monday.

As soon as the Roughriders scored their lone run in the second inning, General bats retaliated with 3 hits and 2 runs in their turn at bat to supply the G-men with a winning margin. Bill Lake added the other tally in the fifth inning as he scored on a wild pitch.

Lake Leads Hitters

Steve Reiter and Dennis Brantley supplied the winning combination, stopping Roosevelt bats with only 4 hits, allowing only 1 walk and striking out 9 batters. Lake led hitting honors with 2 base hits followed by Scott Gilman, Mike Carstens and Reiter who each banded out 1 hit.

The first inning was uneventful as each pitcher retired the first 3 batters in order, with Steve Reiter striking out 2 of the 3.

For each team, the second inning proved to be the biggest. The first man to bat for Roosevelt singled and advanced to second on a fielder's choice. The next man to face Reiter struck out, but was followed by two hits which were enough to score the Teddies' only run. Reiter struck out the next batter to retire the side.

Carstens Hits in Runs

With one out, Gilman hit a single and moved to third base on Lake's one bagger. Lake stole second, putting 2 men in scoring position. Carstens capitalized on this move by hitting a single and scoring the two men on base. The next two batters went out to put an end to the inning.

Roosevelt batters were retired 1-2-3 in the third inning. The G-men were subject to the same fate after Bob Naylor was awarded first base upon being hit by a pitched ball.

Generals Add Run

The fourth inning saw nothing but outs for Roosevelt batters, but the Generals added another run to insure their win. With one out, Lake doubled, took third on a wild pitch, then, following another out, took advantage of a second wild pitch to score. The next batter went out.

The rest of the game was in vain for the Teddies as they were retired in order in the remaining innings. As soon as Reiter hit a

single in the fifth inning General bats were quieted for the remainder of the game.

G-Men Win 2, Lose 2

The previous week's action saw the G-men win 2 and lose 2 games. The Generals succumbed to Jefferson and Lincoln by scores of 4-1 and 3-0, respectively. They matched each loss with a win, however, by blanking Cleveland 2-0, and whitewashing Benson 11-0.

Finishing with a 12-win, 8-loss season, the Generals ended in third place in the over-all standings.

Boys Edge Benson To Finish Season

The boys golf team rounded out their season with a 7-win, 2-loss, 1-tie record after slipping past Benson 7-5 in their match May 6.

With the score tied 5-5 at the end of 5 matches, Terry Isaacs sunk his putt from 2 feet off the green for a par 4. This shot won the individual match for Terry and also gave the boys their overall winning margin.

The girls did not play their match originally scheduled for May 7 due to transportation difficulties on the part of their Lincoln opponents.

"The choice was left up to the girls," commented Vern Lowery, golf coach, "and instead of taking the win by forfeit, they voted to reschedule the match and accept the results, win or lose."

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Dropped Baton Gives Spikers Track Victory Over Jefferson

A dropped baton spelled victory for Mark Cotton's Varsity track team as the Generals nipped Jefferson 70-61 last Friday in a dual meet.

Going into the final event, the 880 yd. relay, the score was 65-61 in favor of the G-Men with the winner of the relay winning the meet. On the second exchange the Jeff team dropped the baton and found themselves 10 yards behind. They couldn't make up the distance and the Generals won the event and the meet.

Outstanding performances were many as 14 Generals displayed their best efforts of the season.

Sophomore Terry Rawlins stepped off the high hurdles in 14.7 seconds to gain first place in the event. He also won the low hurdles in 20.3 seconds. Both efforts were his best of the season.

Richard Fowlkes threw the javelin a record-breaking 205'7½" and teammate Tony Campbell placed second behind him at 194'11". Lane Watson ran his best quarter mile with a time of 50.8 seconds but could only pick up third place points as two Jeff men captured first and second.

Rodney Woods leaped 21'11" in the broad jump but could do no better than fourth place as three Jeff jumpers surpassed him. The jump was Woods' best and would have placed him fourth in last year's state meet.

Girls Nab Second In Marshall Meet

Mary Ann Norman's female spikers compiled 39 points en route to placing second at the Marshall Invitational Track meet held May 6. The girls were only 3 points shy of first place Jefferson who totaled 42 points. A total of 8 schools participated in the meet, including Madison, Marshall, Wilson and Roosevelt of Portland, Milwaukie, and Hudson Bay High school, Vancouver, Washington.

Bernadine Raiford was the only double winner for the Generals. She won the shot put with a throw of 36' and the high jump with a height of 4' 3". Ann Cuthbert and Linda Dickerson placed 1-2 in the 880 yd. run. Ann was clocked in 2:51.1 and Linda in 2:52.5. Eristine Harper ran to a 440 yd. victory in a time of 1:09.8. Linda Redfield was fourth in the event with a time of 1:14.5.

The Generals' medley relay was clocked in 2:16.6 to win that event. Linda Dickerson hurdled to a third place finish in a time of 16.3. The Generals' 440 yd. relay finished third also with a 57.7 clocking. Karen Bennett received fourth honors in the softball throw with a 161'0" toss to round out scoring for the Generals.

The distribution of points went as follows: 5 points for first, 3 for second, 2 for third, and fourth place finishers picked up 1 point.

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JV Baseball Men Earn 3 Victories; Lose to Jefferson

The Junior Varsity baseball team has won 3 out of the last 4 games, winning their last game 6-3 over Lincoln.

Ron Oliver led the Sergeants' hitting attack by banging out 3 hits, collecting 2 runs-batted-in and scoring 1 run. By the end of the game, the JV's had tallied 10 hits against 6 for Lincoln. Each team had 2 errors.

In earlier action, the Sergeants defeated Washington 2-1, were dumped by Jefferson 9-3 and shut-out Benson 7-0. In all 3 games the JV's out-hit their opponents, and although they collected more hits than Jefferson, the Democrats took advantage of 11 Sergeant errors and made only 2 themselves.

Sergeants, Privates Collect Wins; Top Madison in Track Competition

In a dual meet with Madison on May 1, the Junior Varsity and Freshmen track teams each recorded victories.

While surrendering only 4 first places to the opposition, the JV's ran up 77 points to 45 for Madison.

The Frosh avenged an earlier loss to Madison by coming up with a 75-47 win.

The Sergeants had a triple winner in Ray Grubbs who won the 440 yd. dash in 55.9 seconds, the 880 yd. dash at 2:12.2 and broad jumped 18'1". Steve Byers ran to a 4:40.6 mile victory.

For the Privates, Steve Shaw was also a triple winner. He won the 70 yd. high hurdles in 11.2, the 440 yd. dash at 58.6 and threw the discus 102'. Ray Brooks led a Frosh sweep in the 100 yd. dash and stepped off a 25.3 second 220.

The JV's posted other victories with Wayne Signer winning the high hurdles, Junior Johnson the 100 yd. dash, and Pat Stump the 220. Dave Prihnow won the pole

vault at 9'6" and Bob Pape lung the discus a winning 115'¼".

The Privates got victories from Phil Newland in the ¼ mile, Ken Chaseman in the low hurdles, Bob Ewen in the shot put and Doug Anderson in the pole vault. Onla Bates won the broad jump with a leap of 18'8".

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
