Mr. Failor urged that interested and qualified students in need of inancial assistance contact their ounselors for further advice and consult various college catalogs for specific information pertaining to individual interests.





Frosh Matmen Lose First Match To Roosevelt


Jefferson's freshmen pinned a 57-35 loss on the Privates last Friday in the Jefferson gym. In the first half, the lead
