#### College Board Gives Supplementary Exams

Because of the increased emphasis on conversation and speaking, the College Entrance Examination board has developed listening tests which were given in four languages Tuesday.

Only four years old, the tests measure a student's ability to hear and understand the spoken language. The basic language achievement tests specifically measure reading and writing abil-

Greater numbers of colleges are asking for the listening tests as well as achievement tests to learn the ability of tudents in all phases of the language.

German, French, Spanish and Russian are the languages in which the test was given. The scores will be separate from the achievement test scores and sent to the colleges without charge, if the student has taken or plans to take the achievement tests.


